Through all our core subjects our competencies are integrated and are the learning that can be described. They are hard to measure, but essential in order to become *Christ-like, Creative, Critical Learners*. This term our focus is on Hope, which has a global and sustainable outlook. This week we look at the third area which is:

A global perspective

This links to the practical application of our school vision "Through our faith we HELP bring light to the world". Our students are becoming more outward focused, and they have a sense of empowerment. We have built this through LIGHTS projects which are intended to have a positive impact in our community, for example Riparian planting, the Food Bank collection, raising money for SPCA among other things. We also take up other opportunities when we can such as planting in Foster Park, raising money for World Vision, and participating in the Selwyn leadership programme so we are growing students who will positively influence the community around them.
