### **Agricultural Show**

### **Learning Through Play**

Princesses, pirates, cats, dogs, super heroes, mums, dads, babies - so many roles that we have seen our children transform into over the past couple of weeks. If you have been around the Early Childhood scene before, you will know what a central role dress ups play in dramatic play. We love seeing our children engaged in this play, especially when they play together. Below are some of the benefits of dramatic play:



# **Dramatic Play**

- see the world from a different perspective
- expand imaginations
- increase vocabulary
- develop confidence
  - build problemsolving skills.

And it's FUN!

#### **Examples:**

Early examples include Allows Children To: pretending to be a train/airplane. Older kids may Dramatic play occurs when children pretending to be a play house, super hero vs villain, or set up a restaurant with roles (customer, cook, waitress, etc).



#### **How to Encourage:**

Adults can insert themselves into the child's play by being a similar character, talk about what they are doing, and model new examples for play themes.

# >>> Dramatic Play<<<

pretend they are a character, animal, or item. This type of play will increase in complexity and duration as children get older. It begins to develop as early as 12 months, and children should create multiple play scenarios by 3 years of age.

#### Why is it Important?

Dramatic play has tremendous benefits. It can increase imagination, promote vocabulary knowledge and language development, provide practice for executive functioning skills, as well as encourage and refine social skills, empathy, and understanding of point of view Speechie?
